Head Start is a nationwide, federally-funded program which provides a comprehensive range of early childhood development services for pre-school children and their families. We primarily provide services for children from low-income families and children with disabilities.

Catholic Charities Head Start of Baltimore City promotes excellence by providing holistic services, partnering with parents and other community organizations and supporting continuous quality improvement.

Children have fun and learn with activities that help them grow mentally, socially, emotionally and physically. The curriculum promotes child-directed, hands-on learning that is reinforced at home. Services include child development, health, nutrition and services for children with disabilities. Children with disabilities receive the services and intervention necessary to successfully participate in the regular education portion of the program and eventually, in mainstream classrooms. Every child benefits from on-going assessment and the implementation of individualized learning plans.

The Head Start staff recognizes that parents and guardians are children's first and most important teachers, and our teachers partner with families to help children to develop academic skills, as well as confidence and self-reliance. Our program assists parents in developing and achieving personal, educational and employment goals. Mental health services are also available to support healthy family functioning. Parent education and family activities are an important aspect of our program.



The curriculum is aligned with the Head Start Child Outcomes Framework.

Our Head Start program also uses the Work Sampling System for child assessment. This is the same tool that the public school system uses for child assessment. Each child is assessed three times per year. Individual Development Plans are written and implemented for each child based on the Work Sampling data, observations and parent input. Individual Education Plans (IEP) are incorporated into individual classroom goals for children.

The percentage of four year-old children assessed as proficient in each of the ten domain areas of the Work Sampling System (i.e. Social Emotional, Approaches to Learning, Language Development, Literacy Knowledge and Skill, Mathematics Knowledge and Skill, Science Knowledge and Skill Creative Arts Expression, Physical Development and Health, Logic and Reasoning, Social Studies Knowledge and skills) ranges from 73% -93%. The average percentage increase from the first assessment period to the third assessment period was 25% for children entering kindergarten.
