
CELEBRATING 40 YEARS

1977-2017

allagher Services is celebrating 40 years of support and service to individuals with intellectual disabilities. Our doors opened at The Pot Spring Road location in 1977 when 13 children from Rosewood Center, a state institution serving people with developmental disabilities from 1888 - 2009, moved into that location. Nine of those 13 children are now adults supported by Gallagher Services living, working and participating in our community. Our mission then and now - is to open doors to a fuller life for people with intellectual disabilities.





By 1978 we were supporting 50 individuals residentially in the Timonium location in a dorm-like setting.

The Francis X. Gallagher Center was dedicated on July 24, 1977, in honor of the late Mr. Gallagher, founder of the law firm Gallagher, Evelius & Jones. He worked tirelessly on behalf of the poor and disenfranchised as a Board Member for Catholic Charites of Baltimore.

1980s

Several Alternative Living Units (ALU's), small 3 person homes, were opened to support individuals in the community.




Acquired six homes from the Franciscan Sisters and opened two day programs.



The Gribbin Center, located in Perry Hall, was purchased in 1987 for \$1 from Baltimore County. The old school building was renovated and the Gribbin Center opened their doors providing day program services.

Assumed the Chestnut Hill Day Program to help support our individuals who were aging out of the school system.



Rosewood closed in June 2009. Twenty-one individuals came in to residential services. Led to us expanding into Harford County, opening several homes in the community.



As the individuals we support are aging, we have added inhome hospice care.

In 2010, Goucher College and Gallagher partnered to exhibit individuals' art. Individuals also had a joint semester-long class with students.

We currently have 47 homes in Baltimore City, Harford, Anne Arundel and Baltimore

counties, serving 250 individuals.



The Timonium apartments were downsized and licensed as group homes. Many of the individuals moved from the building to community homes, and the apartments' focus was on the individuals we supported who were aging and medically complex.









Gallagher participated in Catholic Charities Day in Annapolis, where Gallagher Services was recognized on the Senate floor for 40 years of service to Maryland.


